

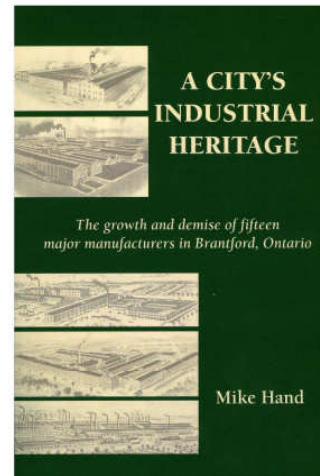

EXPOSITOR ARCHIVES COME TO BHS

The BHS is pleased to report that the Expositor Archives are now being held at the Museum-in-the-Square. The archives, consisting of negatives, clipping files, and bound copies of the newspaper were moved to the museum this month. The BHS has been working closely with the Expositor to ensure the preservation of this important collection. With the Expositor's recent move into a new facility, finding an appropriate place to store and care for the archives was a priority. "We are pleased that the BHS was able to acquire this important collection and will be working with the Expositor to ensure it remains accessible for the community." says Joan Kanigan, BHS Executive Director. A priority for the BHS will be to digitize the negatives in the collection as many of the images from the 1940s are beginning to deteriorate rapidly. The BHS has received support from the City of Brantford—Community Grants to begin the process of digitizing the estimated 1 million images in the collection.

Youth Without Borders is an expression of the experiences and hopes newcomer youth have in Brantford. Using photography as the medium, this exhibit tells the story of newcomer youth from their perspective. Curated by Hans Laun, Kavita Nadlall, Tiffany Nadlall, and Alana Nadlall, with the assistance of Brant Museum & Archives staff, this exhibit brings these photographic images together to share the story of these students as they embark on a new life in Brantford.



The exhibit began as a media arts venture to help newcomer youth at Pauline Johnson Collegiate use photography as a means of expression. Lasting 5 weeks during the Spring 2010 school term, staff from the YMCA's Immigrant Settlement Services worked with youth from all over the world, teaching them different photography skills and techniques.

The exhibit is currently on display in the lobby at City Hall - 1 Wellington Street, Brantford ON.

Why did the country pursue prohibition and why did we ultimately abandon it? Find out in this fascinating exhibit on loan from the Peterborough Museum & Archives.

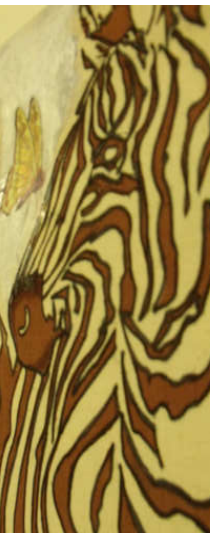
